Gary Traill passed away on the night of Saturday April 11<sup>th</sup> after suffering from a serious illness in recent months.

He was born and brought up in the eastern suburbs of Sydney. He graduated in law from Sydney University and worked as a corporate lawyer, including General Counsel for AMP. He and Suzanne married in 1980 and had six children, four boys and two girls. The boys went to St Joseph's College and the girls to Loreto Kirribilli.

Gary and Suzanne were actively involved in the life of the College particularly while their sons, Julian, Chris, Paul and Mark were students there.

He was also an active member of the Hunters Hill community being involved in the local Catholic parish in Hunters Hill and the broader catholic community. For many years he was an acolyte in Villa Maria Catholic Church and was Hunters Hill Citizen of the Year in 2016. In addition he was a tireless worker for Hunters Hill Community Services and instigated the establishment of the Hunters Hill Men's Shed.

He was named Citizen of the Year in recognition of his work in the community and for his contribution to St Joseph's College in Hunters Hill.

Gary was a member of our Probus club from December 7<sup>th</sup>, 2010 until his passing.

His funeral mass was held in the college chapel on Friday April 17<sup>th</sup> presided by his brother in law.

### A Community Announcement - Woolwich Wharf Upgrade

Anthony Robert's office has recently issue advice that work to deliver an accessibility upgrade at Woolwich Wharf will start this month. The upgrade is part of the NSW Government's Transport Access Program, an initiative to provide safe, modern and accessible public transport infrastructure across the state. The work is expected to take about five months to complete.

To allow ferries to continue to operate while Woolwich Wharf is closed for construction a temporary wharf will be established at Clarke Road Wharf, next to the Deckhouse. Minor work is required to ensure the temporary wharf is operational. This work will begin on 27 April and take about four weeks to complete. A temporary bus route will also be put in place to operate between Hunters Hill and Clarkes Point to service the temporary wharf. This bus service will be in addition to the existing bus services in the area.

Please note this is completely unrelated to the issues involved in the recent Transdev proposal to change the timetable.

## In Time for Anzac Day - French Raise Money for Bushfires

Villers-Bretonneux has never forgotten Australia. In April 1918, against the odds, two Australian brigades helped liberate the French town from the Germans at a cost of 1,200 killed.

The Australian flag still flies over Villers-Bretonneux. A plaque outside the Town Hall tells the story of the events of 1918 and kangaroos feature over the building's entrance. The main street is named Rue de Melbourne. The children of Villers-Bretonneux are especially indebted to Australia. After the war, it was money collected by schoolchildren in Victoria that paid for the rebuilding of the town's school. It was named Victoria School and a permanent plaque on the school façade recalls the diggers sacrifice. That is why the town launched a fund raiser in February to raise money for the bushfire relief. An online fundraising page has received donations from more than 800 people. The town also organised a solidarity march on 2 February. Almost 1000 people braved the winter weather and walked from the town centre to the Australian National Memorial and Sir John Monash Centre. There the local school choir sang a song specially written for the appeal, entitled "Australia Stop Burning".

"Everyone here was talking about the fires and we were all appalled," Mayor Patrick Simon told a Newscorp reporter.

By late February, some \$37,000 had been collected by the town. Mayor Simon said some of the funds raised would be donated to the firefighters in Robinvale, an Australian town that has been twinned with Villers-Bretonneux since the First World War when the son of Robinvale's founding family was killed in air combat near Villers-Bretonneux. The rest of the funds will be donated to the Bega Valley Shire, identified as an area particularly devastated by the bushfires.

The children in the local school drew pictures of the fires, which will be displayed in the town's Franco-Australian Museum. Some of the pictures were sent to fire brigades across Australia.

Many other fundraisers have taken place elsewhere in Northern France, including a solidarity run in Vignacourt, which raised more than \$8,000. A number of small villages, the town of Amiens and the Hauts-de-France region have all committed different donation amounts directed at either wildlife or replanting associations. Various concerts have been held throughout the region and local associations have knitted and sewn blankets and pouches for the affected wildlife.

The remarkable acts of generosity further reinforce the strong bonds between and this region for more than a century.
