Congratulations



Les Osborne was born in England in 1919 and he came to Australia with his father (an ANZAC and Western front veteran) after WWI and his mother, a nurse, arriving in Sydney in December 1919.

Les left school at 14 and worked as an apprentice in an engineering company. In 1938 he joined the permanent RAAF and trained as a fitter armourer. During the war he worked as a bombing and gunnery instructor. He later volunteered to do a bomb disposal officer's course in Singapore. Fortunately he got on a plane back to Australia a few weeks before Singapore fell to the Japanese in 1942. During his war service he was stationed in Darwin, the islands off Papua New Guinea and later at RAAF headquarters where his used his armament skills extensively and successfully

which is why he survived this rather dangerous period of the war on Australia's doorstep. He ended the war with rank of Squadron Leader.

During 1942 he met Betty, a Corporal in the WAAF. They married in 1943. After war they moved to Newcastle where Les worked as a Manager for an engineering company. After 4 years in Newcastle they moved to Sydney and settled in Ryde where Les had accepted a position as Mill Manager with Harold Meggitt Pty Ltd, an oil seed manufacturing company. The factory was originally located in area around where the current Banjo Patterson restaurant is now in Gladesville. Les retired from Meggitt Ltd. in 1984.

After he retired from Meggitt Ltd, Les worked for the Eastwood Community Services as a handyman assisting elderly people and also assisted with Meals on Wheels for many years. In 1987 Les was being approached by businesses for advice and he saw this as an opportunity to start a consulting business advising companies in the design and construction of oil seed manufacturing factories. He was active in his consultancy business until 2008 when he decided to finally retire.

In 1962 Les joined the Hunters Hill Rotary Club and saw the formation of the present Probus Club of Hunters Hill. Les has been a member (and later a life member) of the Probus Club for over 30 years.

Les and Betty had 3 children: Geoffrey, Susan and Christopher. Les also has 4 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren. Les and Betty were active grandparents in their grandchildren's lives and activities.

Betty passed away in 2002 after a very happy, fulfilling marriage of 59 years. Les has travelled extensively in his 80s and early 90s on organised holidays in Outback Australia, Tasmania, New Zealand and Singapore. Les has always had a "can do" attitude and an adventurous side to his life.

Now 100 years of age, Les still enjoys good health and can look back on a fulfilling, interesting and successful life.

The president informed members that we needed to finish the meeting today promptly at 11.30am because the HHC was hosting another function. Susi Prescott - "Where Hummingbirds Dance

Carol Pelham introduced Susi Prescott, who told us about her life with the children of the slums of Arequipa, the second largest city in Peru.

Suzi was a French teacher in Sydney, with a comfortable life. This life was shattered in 2006 with the break-up of her thirtyyear marriage. She decided to run away as fast and as far as she could and went to Nepal for three months, teaching English in orphanage schools. In 2007 she travelled to Rwanda, once again teaching in poor schools. Later that year she went to Peru with friends, intending to stay a year, but has been going back ever since.

Suzi has become a 'godmother' to the 250 children at Elohim, a school in the desert slums of Arequipa. The government of Peru provides little money towards schools, and most of the support comes from Suzi, from the sale of her books. Students are given uniforms , which they love, and hot meals for breakfast and lunch. The children have cooking and sewing classes and an electrical workshop has been set up. A library has been established with the assistance of a Rotary Club in the USA.

Ninety percent of the people are illiterate and don't see the point of their children getting an education; eighty percent of the women are single mothers and can't contribute to running the school. Drunkenness and violence are part of

In the time that she's been going to Peru Suzi has been kidnapped, had her apartment robbed and been pickpocketed several times. When she first went there, she thought she knew what the Peruvian people needed. She's learned not to be

judgmental but to accept the people as they are.

Suzi's book "Where the Humming Birds Dance" was very popular with members and all proceeds go towards running the school.

"I had a short chat with her whilst there and she told me to tell you she sold \$550 worth of her book to our Probus members. She was quite over the moon. She said she will put the money towards 'her' library in the school in the purchase of books and cushions. She will send you a photo to show us when this is done."
