The Probus Memorial Bell

or

(Remembering Albert Baz)

At each meeting of the club our President sits behind a table on which is displayed various pieces of Probus memorabilia, including a brass bell. The bell's purpose is evident when it is struck, with the sound echoing around the room, so we may be brought to order in the (unlikely) event of our becoming rowdy, or to bring us back to our seats after morning tea to listen to our guest speaker of the day. The bell has been a part of each meeting for much of the past decade. We know this because the bell carries a small and sim-



ple plaque, inscribed "In memory of Albert Baz - 2009".

So, who was Albert Baz, and what is the story of the bell?

Albert was a member of our club for most of the 1990's and up to early 2009. He was a keen attendee at meetings, and when his health allowed he enjoyed the occasional day-outing. He was an undemonstrative and quiet kind of fellow, but quick to warm to others. He clearly enjoyed the "fun and friendship" that is a mark of Probus, but in our club he found something else, perhaps of more importance – the companionship of others, including that of his dear friend, Arthur, husband of the lady everyone knows, Pat Cox.

Arthur and Albert loved to sit in the front row, directly under the gaze of the President and others at the official table. From that advantageous position Arthur could be sure that his many, very witty, interjections would be heard. The result was to see Albert, most of the audience, and even the President of the time being reduced to helpless laughter. Then, as the meetings went on it was not unknown for both Albert and Arthur to fall gently asleep, their presence only being noted by the occasional squeak from Albert's hearing aid. I know all this from personal experience as when, during my Presidential term, I copped the occasional Arthur Cox barb, which always reminded me to stop needless pontificating. And at times I would also be reminded that what I was saying couldn't be too important, what with the audience in direct eye-line being sound asleep!

The Probus club and its members were very important to Albert, and his affection for others was returned in spades. He died in 2009. At his memorial service the many club members who were present had the pleasure of meeting Albert's grown children and other close relatives. It was then that we learned of Albert's wish, fully endorsed by his family, that the sum of \$500 be made available to our club from his estate.

At first the Management Committee was concerned about the propriety of the club accepting such a gift. But, thankfully, all agreed that if it was Albert's wish, then we should accept. We informed the family, and in doing so, said we wanted to ensure the bulk of the money went to something of a permanent nature – to honour Albert. So it was that the idea of a memorial bell came about. And knowing Albert, he would have loved the idea of the bell being struck from time to time, to wake him from his slumbers.

This year, among others, we have heard about the makeover for the Opera House, life on the front line of police and another on the mounted police, the Japanese attack on Sydney Harbour and one on the NSW State Library. Certainly a mixed smorgasbord and something for each of us. Carole Pelham has been the Speakers organizer on the committee for the past several years and finds her people in a variety of ways. First she must find those who have special stories to tell, and then persuade them to come to us. How does she do it? Through articles in magazines in doctors' waiting rooms, in which she looks out for likely people, researches them on the internet and then makes contact by phone or email. Judging by results, she must be very persuasive. She contacts other Probus clubs for recommendations, checks out speakers at the local library, and also finds them in the Active Retirees and Seniors magazines. Many thanks to a busy lady doing a very worthwhile job.

Ross and Josephine McBride recently returned from a 7 day/6 night trip to Longreach in Queensland on an odyssey to some of the most historic places in Australian history. They travelled on the "Spirit of the Outback", Queensland's iconic train, from Brisbane to Longreach and return. This was a twenty-six hour trip each way, complete with sleeping berths and wonderful meals, including wine and other drinks.

Whilst in Longreach they visited the Stockman's Hall of Fame, a museum which honours the pioneers of the Australian outback including the white and Aboriginal stockmen. They also visited the Qantas Founders Museum which has just acquired a Super Constellation aircraft to complement the 747 and 707 that they already have. Qantas is the third oldest airline in the world. It was founded in November 1920 in Winton as Queensland and Northern Territory Aerial Services Limited and began international passenger flights in May 1935.

They also visited Winton whose other claim to fame is that Banjo Patterson wrote "Waltzing Matilda" here. Another day was spent visiting the little village of Ilfracombe where Dame Quentin Bryce was born.

Book Club



One of many things we all agreed on in our review of *Big Little Lies* was that 'in our day'mmmm, maybe showing our age here, we would have been mortified if our parents had turned up at school. This did not however prevent us from enjoying what turned out to be

a surprisingly complex and often amusing book.

Principally told through the voices of the three main characters the many themes resonated, especially in relation to rape, abuse, solo parenting and the difficulties of 'fitting in'. Lesser themes covered obsession with appearance, the challenge of managing the blended family, and the involvement of the parents in the dynamics of the school. We thought that this involvement was born of guilt since many of the characters were what today are referred to as 'helicopter' parents, self absorbed or career absorbed.

The book discloses the cliques that exist within the community of parents of a kindergarten class at a beach suburb north of Sydney. Central to the story is a death, accidental or otherwise, that has occurred at the school trivia night. Who the victim is underpins the suspense of the novel, but really plays second fiddle to the fascinating cast of characters, some eliciting empathy, others distaste. We agreed it was a compelling read, and as over fourteen million copies have been sold, we are obviously not alone in this view.

Deirdre was unable to attend but sent the recommendation of her most recent personal read, 'Prague Sonata' by Bradford Morrow, and we welcomed Richard Jones as a new member to the group.

The book for next month is "Astronauts Guide to Life on Earth" the autobiography of Chris Hadfield, the first Canadian in space.

Foundation for National Park's and Wildlife

The planned guest speaker, Julian Leatherdale, was unable to attend due to illness. Carol Pelham, therefore, invited, rather, cajoled our member Greg Griffiths to step in at very short notice and Greg made an entertaining and interesting speech from his considerable knowledge about the Foundation of National Parks and Wildlife.

Greg's association with FNPW began when the company he worked for, Kimberly-Clark, was approached to become a corporate donor. This led to Greg becoming a director, and later a governor of the Foundation.

FNPW is a not for profit non-governmental organisation whose purpose is to foster the protection of Australia's native plants, animals and cultural heritage through education and conservation projects. It acquires land through purchase, donations and bequests. This includes the Mungo National Park and the Daintree Rainforest, as well as fifty other national parks and nature reserves. It also funds threatened species recovery programs. Animals saved from extinction include the Lord Howe Island wood hen and the yellow-footed rock wallaby, as well as the reintroduction of the mallee fowl in areas where they previously existed.
