But do they know that there is a plaque commemorating this and the plague can be viewed on the wall entering the Hunters Hill Community Hall in Gladesville Road.

The plaque records that our club was formed on the 3^{rd} February 1976 and there is a photo of the 21 men who were the founding members.

It is quite astounding that in the 44 years since Probus was formed that it has now grown to over 2000 clubs across Australia.

There is some discussion about the future of the current buildings on the site in terms of any developments of the area, demolition or change of use.

We have written to the Hunters Hill Council advising that, naturally our Club would like to keep the plaque in this location, however if it is the intention of the Hunters Hill Council to either demolish the Community Centre building, or do otherwise with it, we would be very keen to maintain it for our archives.
