Probus Small Groups

Starting at the first 2021 meeting on Tuesday 2^{nd} February you will be invited to sign up to a number of 'small group activities' catering to individual interests that may not be shared by the whole club.

For each event members will arrange their own transport and pay at the event. At the meeting, leaders will be responsible for explaining the particular activity, the date, time and cost and then signing up members. The 'Event Sheet' completed with those details ensures the Probus personal insurance applies.

For instance, Dean Letcher will be Leader of the *Exotic Lunch* group, whose first event will be lunch for maximum 12 at the Eastwood Seafood restaurant at Rowe Street Eastwood on a date to be announced but during February and to be repeated later.

This is intended to be an introduction to Cantonese Chinese dishes which is the speciality of the restaurant. Guangzhou province is in the southern warm part of the Chinese coastline (next to Hong Kong) so they eat lots of seafood, white rice and fresh greens. The meal will be sharing: Pippies in XO sauce with vermicelli, Braised tofu with minced fish, Fried glutinous rice and Stirfry mixed summer vegetables with mushrooms with Steam rice and Chinese tea – all for about \$40.00.

Additional dishes and alcohol may be ordered and paid for by members – "You order, You pay" but everyone pays the \$40.00 whether they eat a lot or a little. Large free parking station nearby. The date and exact details will be on a sheet given to those signing up

A month later the *Exotic Lunch* will be at The Hills restaurant Hunters Hill for a Lebanese lunch typical of much Middle Eastern cuisine for a cost of about \$40.00 each. Given the infertile sandy soils, heat and dryness of the region the locals have perfected making the most of chickpeas, flat bread, parsley and a little protein. The leader will introduce and explain the dishes – labneh, hoummos, baba ganoush, falafel, tabbouli and fattoush plus sweet lemon juice and tea. Again, additional dishes or alcohol – "you order, you pay".

Later experiences: Na Zdrowie [Polish], Szechuan Chinese [Glebe], Uighur (Burwood]

ART GALLERY:

Leader, to be advised, will take first 12 members signing up for visits to artists' studios, small art galleries, new and stimulating exhibitions. Leader to introduce artist's work or obtain a gallery person to give a short talk. Initially all members to transport themselves. Later when numbers stabilize a bus may be organized. First event – visit Ross McBride in his working pottery in Hunters Hill. Date to be announced – no cost but Ross is always ready to meet the market

Later experiences: Mosman Art Gallery, Lane Cove Council gallery, Rushcutter galleries.

HARBOUR LUNCHING:

To enjoy lunch with friends at a harbourside restaurant with reasonable but not cheap pricing and with a fabulous harbour view. The leader [yet to nominate] will accept first 12 members for a weekday lunch, self-transport or public transport. All to order and pay for self at restaurant

Examples: Sydney Rowing Club Abbotsford – fabulous views – Opal ferry Huntleys Point to Abbotsford. Sydney Flying Squadron Kirribilli, Drummoyne Sailing Club, MCA Circular Quay.

A One Year Review

As some of you know, we were trapped for 3 days in Narooma last New Year, ringed by roaring black fires and no power for anything which made us feel totally helpless. Also, no petrol, no lights, no phones, no sunshine, no avoiding black ash, no communications from authorities as their phone lines crashed, no room for locals and tourists packing the golf Club and fairways packed with cars/caravans with families with babies huddling.

And what's more NO COFFEE SHOPS !!!

Finally, we received an urgent call to say the road to Bega had just been reopened if we left immediately. Clothes and belongings were thrown into our car and the Manager of the Motel pleaded with us "You will return"?

The promise was made and we returned on Boxing Day 2020 to give support and see the recovery for ourselves. In fact we were pleasantly surprised to see how well the trees were looking, lovely with soft downy leaves sprouting, the countryside was lush and green, the dams full as were the cattle that grazed content and well fed. Accommodation was full and restaurants needing bookings to be seated.

That was the vision we first witnessed. However, while Jan checked out the shops in Cobargo and Bermagui, I sought out the locals to discuss their experiences and it was not pretty listening. One couple had earlier moved down from Sydney to start a new life, bought a property planted an orchard, built a house only to have their farm and house totally destroyed. They are now slowly rebuilding but had lost all of their memories and valuables. I checked with the local post mistress in Cobargo who was told hers and two other buildings were priorities to be saved as the fire threatened to totally destroy the small township. The wind changed at the last moment - they lost their property. Others were still living, rent free, in small unit accommodation wherever available, together with caravan only options. One lady who made beaded jewellery, lost her home and all bead stock and was in a caravan where she now lives and works. Some people from all over the world, on hearing of her loss via the media, have responded, sending a wonderful assortment of replacements which has delighted her with their generosity

Similar stories are told in Bermagui where one person told me that again, when fire threatened the township but a wind change stopped the tragedy, he was away fighting fires. His own home was destroyed and his mother dying at the same time. Only now a start to a new home being built.

Interesting, there were reports that charity money had not been seen but we were told that was not correct, although the Government money was slow in coming.

All the locals had very similar disturbing stories.

Therefore, it is timely to show our continued support by a visit to this repository of Australian applied arts and science. It is probably a while since you took your kids or grandkids, so come along to see if anything has changed.

Planned timetable.

9:24 am ferry from Woolwich Wharf to Circular Quay, L3 light rail (tram) via George Street to China Town stop, change to L1 light rail Dulwich Hill line to Exhibition Centre stop, then 10 minute walk to Museum entrance in Harris Street, arriving about 10:35 am. Check in at entry using QR code. Wear face mask while in museum.

Government COVID-19 regulations currently prohibit Group Tours, so entry is individual free) to the museum and inspection of displays is individually or in small groups. Meet for lunch about 12:30 pm at MAAS Café. Continue individual or small group inspection of displays. Return home by reverse route at your convenience.

Extension of President's Term

At the 6th October General Meeting it was proposed that, given the disjointed year brought about by the Corona Virus, the term of the Committee be extended for a further year, through to February 2021. This proposition falls within the confines of our Constitution. The proposal was met with agreement by the vast majority of members present.

However, the Constitution, Management Clause 4(b) states "The term of office of the President shall be one year, which may be extended to not more than two consecutive years if required due to special circumstances."

Therefore at the meeting on February 2nd the following motion will be put to the Membership and a vote will be taken.


MOTION

"That, as a one off occurrence, for the purposes of Management Clause 4(b) of the club's Constitution the 'SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES', provision be now agreed as applying, this because of the COVID-19 pandemic and its many restrictions on the club, its management and on individual Members.

Further, that the term of the President and Committee be extended until February 2022."

A stated previously, notwithstanding the motion above being passed, any member wishing to nominate for a position on the Management committee is a liberty to do so. Nomination forms are held by the Secretary and will be available at the meeting. They need to be completed and handed back to the Secretary prior to the closure of the meeting.
