TECHNICAL TOURS - David Lorsch, 0428 247 708 I

EXOTIC LUNCH GROUP - Dean Letcher

Not in Australia but in most of the world, food preparation has evolved from centuries of subsistence farming where you ate only what you grew. If nothing grew in winter, then you smoked, dried, salted or pickled what you produced in summer. These provincial cuisines differ according to the climate and the country. So, Guandong [Cantonese] cooking has ingredients and style radically different from Szechuan, northern Italian from southern Italian or Greek – and all different from 'modern Australian'.

The group leader will introduce you to these new experiences at lunch in ethnic restaurants on the *1st Thursday of every month*. It should cost less than \$40 per head but the menus will be chosen in advance by the leader. If you wish something different or additional then you order it and pay for it.

Each outing will be in the Newsletter and announced at the members monthly meeting. You will need to add your name to a list and receive a sheet with details. Numbers are limited. Pay at the restaurant.

Technical Outing - Powerhouse Museum

On 9th February last, 9 members enjoyed an outing to the Powerhouse Museum at Ultimo. It was the first of a series of variants of the previous "Opal Outings" which will focus on destinations with a technical interest, but still using public transport whenever possible for the economy of \$2.50 daily Opal fares and with light lunch facilities on site at the destination.



Most of us enjoyed the ferry trip from Woolwich to Circular Quay and then two short light rail trips to get from Hunters Hill to the Museum, but Mike and Jill found the bus from Ryde to the Museum door more convenient.

The Museum was very quiet after the business during the school holidays but with no school groups on the day. Notwithstanding information seen previously on the web site advised that most displays would be available, in fact many areas were closed for construction

of new displays. However, unexpectedly a staff member was available to give us a short group tour and explanation of some of the intact displays before lunch. The Museum café offered a good selection of food for a light lunch, after which most members departed independently for other venues. Those who remained



found that the Museum shop offered a good selection of merchandise for souvenirs or presents. We also enjoyed a couple of intact displays that were missed during the earlier tour.

It is intended that further Technical Outings be held on the second Tuesday of each second month, so the next outing will be on 13th April – look for details in the April Newsletter. Please tell me if there is a particular focus that you would like included in the program.
