Visit to ANZAC Memorial Sydney

On 8th February, 15 members of the Club visited the Memorial after a light lunch at a cafe in Liverpool Street, opposite the entrance to the Memorial.



The visit started with a video, followed by a single actress dramatisation, of the experiences of four nurses who served in the First World War. The drama was expertly presented and showed that its title, "Devoted Service", was thoroughly justified in representing the service given by the nurses.

It was followed by a discussion between the Club visitors, the actress, Emma, and other Memorial staff about the experiences that had been represented.

Most Club visitors were surprised to learn that, although the nurses were transported by troop ship from Australia to the places where they served on the other side of the World, they were mostly left to arrange their own repatriation, at their own cost, after the War ended.

Memorial staff then guided the visitors on a tour of the recently added galleries on the lower level before proceeding through the older sections of the Memorial on both the lower and upper levels.

The tour showed that the Memorial is a dignified but sombre tribute to the sacrifice and service given by men and women, particularly from NSW.

Book Club



"The Museum of Modern Love" By Heather Rose"

The book club met on Friday with sadly depleted numbers but much willing participation.

Below is my (mostly) spin on things.

"Art is in the eye of the beholder"—an aphorism with particular resonance in the Museum of Modern Love. Dean prosecuted his views by proxy and they encapsulated the feelings of our small but vocal group—it must however be pointed out that there were diverse interpretations of art which will be promulgated today. Dean was clearly upset by the contrived activity of sitting and looking at people, this deemed to be art motivated by love. So his jury was of the view that for something to be "art" it has to give a new perspective on something, induce a different feeling or see something new in a scene or object.

It was not however a unanimous verdict, Margaret T conceded that she likes modern art, but had to push herself to complete, suggesting that the first half resonated with her feelings of illness, death and dying and championed "The Artist is Present" as a form of modern art, but decried the self mutilation.

Juliet opined that it's not a bad book, but a difficult read—and what is good writing anyway???when the genre deals with staring interminably into the artist's eyes.

But Vincie brought us back to earth— very difficult and stupid, she said, much body abuse but some interesting characters. This widely acclaimed, quasi historical novel left the reviewer in a quandary. Perhaps one of us is in a parallel universe!

This is the story of new art with many facets—masochism, self harm, nudity and is partly factual where Marina Abramovic sits at a table all day for 75 days whilst thousands of people queue up daily to sit opposite and stare or voyeuristically watch CCTV. Woven amongst the factual bits are a number of domestic tribulations and love stories gone wrong or sadly amiss. These vignettes play out while Marina sits with legs tightly crossed staring at her willing partners across the table.

There is a common theme of dysfunctional childhood and domestic unhappiness and a sad terminal illness. Things get pretty messy and we are unsure as to when reality ends and fantasy begins.

I found this book to be deeply disturbing. And to make matters worse the male partners do not emerge unscathed, so here are five tips for a woman:

- It is important that a man helps you around the house and has a job.
- 2. It is important that a man makes you laugh
- 3. It is important to find a man you can count on and doesn't lie to you
- 4. It is important that a man loves you and spoils you
- 5. It is important that these four men don't know each other

Exotic Lunch

There was a lot of tea-drinking, sucking on chicken feet and fumbling with dumplings as 20 Probians explored Cantonese Yum Cha at lunch. The Rhodes Phoenix restaurant is large and almost entirely patronized by the Chinese residents of the Rhodes area, with incursions by the few 'white ghosts' and Chinese from other suburbs. Some preferred spoon-and-fork, some chopsticks but a fine feast was had by all.

NEXT UP is An atmospheric Vietnamese restaurant 12 noon Friday 11 March "Pho Sam" in the Lane Cove Plaza between the ANZ Bank and the newsagent. Phone 9427 1655 but expect Viet accented directions.

Best parking is in the council carpark although there is some in Longueville Road. Everyone will order and pay separately. Special recommendations are the Pho (brisket beef noodle soup) which is a staple of Viet cuisine, Crispy skin chicken with tomato rice, anything with flat rice noodle – actually it is hard to go wrong. Not licensed, very reasonable prices. Do try the hot Viet coffee with condensed milk

Nicholas Cowdery - Issues in Justice

At February's Probus meeting our guest speaker was Nicholas Cowdery AO, QC, who served as the Director of Public Prosecutions for NSW from 1994 to 2011. He also served as President of the International Association of Prosecutors from 1999 to 2005.

He spoke broadly about justice reform and of the effect of COVID on the system.

He explained the 19th century criminal and justice system focused only on crime and imprisonment, neither resulting in fewer prisoners. He considered it was time for change in the way First Nation people and juveniles were treated by the system; and that legislation for euthanasia, use of drugs, a Federal ICAC, a Bill of Rights and abolition of imprisonment of women, was important.

He explained the health orders for COVID were the greatest in number of health orders issued since the Public Health Act began.

Unfortunately, some had more severe fines than the same of-

fence under existing legislation and should be changed.



In just two months between July – August 2021 there were 36,997 breaches of health orders. Ninety five percent of those charged were non-aboriginal males aged 18-39 of whom about half had been charged for other offences in the last 5 years.

However, crime rates due to lockdown plus other factors decreased to the lowest levels ever. For example, for murder (improvements in medicines increasing victims' survival rate and stricter gun laws), assault (drink driving laws and social media opinion on drugs), robbery (people carrying cards not cash), break and entry, car theft (immobilizers), retail theft (shops closed), and malicious damage. Sadly, domestic violence increased, as incompatible couples spent more time together.

Unfortunately, despite the fall in crime, the number in prison awaiting trial increased, as the availability of courts halved as COVID distancing rules forced the jury, the defendant and others to use two courtrooms for the proceedings which were visually linked.

Deborah Lohman (and others)
