
This years exhibition was smaller than previous years but it was still fascinating. We were all able to sit in the small gallery and enjoy a coffee and a chat before viewing the paintings.

Our next Art Group outing will be to the Museum of Contemporary Art at Circular Quay on Friday 28 April.

We will meet at the entrance of the gallery at noon. Following our tour of the gallery we will have lunch on the 4th floor with views the harbour.

The exhibition is as follows:

Yirrkala Prints: Artist Room, MCA Collection (A presentation of collagraphs by six senior Yolnu artists).

Acknowledging and celebrating a communal model of practice and the notion of collectivity that is at the core of Yolnu knowledges and worldviews, this exhibition brings together a selection of recent collagraphs by six senior Yolnu artists: Nongirrna Marawili, Dhuwarrwarr Marika, Barayuwa Munungurr, Mr. W. Wanambi, Ms. M. Wirrpanda and Ms. N. Yunupinu.

The prints were produced in collaboration with printer Sean Richard Smith at the Yirrkala Print Space at Buku-Larrngay Mulka Centre, the oldest Aboriginal owned and run print studio in Australia, founded in 1995, in north-east Arnhem Land. A place of continued innovation and experimentation, led by Yolnu women, the Yirrkala Print Space is distinctive amongst remote community art centres, focussing on the production of limited-edition fine art prints by locally employed and trained Indigenous printmakers on behalf of Yolnu artists.

These works showcase the unique visual language of each artist and their innovations within the collagraphic medium. In many of these, materials collected on Country, such as sand, leaves and rags were used to create the marks and surface textures, over which a second layer of screen-printing was added. Embedded in the works are the artists' individual expressions of their clans and Country.

Miny'tji (sacred clan designs) are not permitted to be reproduced by mechanical means. Consultation with Yolŋu Elders informs the working protocols that allow for artistic experimentation at Buku-Larrŋgay Mulka Centre, while ensuring that sacred designs are not compromised through the printmaking process.

# PROBUS CLUB OF HUNTERS HILL AND DISTRICT INC. MINUTES OF THE 47<sup>th</sup>ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING SPORTIES CLUB, GLADESVILLE TUESDAY, MARCH 7, 2023

#### Welcome

President Dean Letcher opened the 47th Annual General Meeting of the Probus of Hunters Hill and District at 11.07 am.

#### **Present and Apologies**

Names of those present will be taken from the attendance sheet along with apologies.

#### Confirmation of the Minutes of 2022 AGM

Moved Joe Stockreiter, seconded: Mike Regnis. Carried.

#### **Matters Arising**

No matters arising.

#### **Auditors Report**

The President tabled the Auditor's Report, moved to be accepted by Jim Likidis, seconded Pat Cox. Carried.

#### Report from the Treasurer

The Treasurer gave PowerPoint presentation of the 2022 Report, detailing operating expenses, the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary reserve and advised that with the Balance Sheet in a strong position, \$10,000 was invested in a term deposit at 4% per annum, paid monthly with compound interest.

He stated that surplus from the last financial year was \$3,827. Any surpluses of activities, raffle etc. is returned to members by way of subsidies towards lunches and the reserve for the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations.

He advised that the Club's membership stood at 88 at the beginning of the year and with fluctuations of losing and gaining new members, it remained at 88.

He estimated that the reserve for the Club's Anniversary celebrations will amount to \$12,000 after the next three years. The Club being the first in Australia, Ideas are sought for showcasing its 50th Anniversary.

Moved that the report be received: Lesley Pike, seconded Kathy O'Sullivan. Carried.

#### Appointment of Auditor

The President advised that with the retirement of Anthony Alexandrou, member Jim Macready has agreed to take up the position of Auditor. Moved Dean Letcher that Jim Macready be appointed as Auditor for 2023 - 2024, seconded Mike Allum. Carried.

#### President's Report

President Dean addressed the members that it has been an honour to represent the Club as President and has enjoyed mingling with the members old and new. As pointed out by the Treasurer we have a constant figure of 88 members, (62% women, 38% men), pretty good, however more members are being sought.

Ladies' Probus after 35 years will sadly be discontinued and their members are welcome to join this Club.

Variety of activities is important, eg Thursday morning coffee is popular, movies, golf, wine tasting, exotic and scenic dining, a music group and recently introduced plant swap on a give-away basis.

The President commented that for the Club to stay viable there must be continuing interest in assisting the committee and being prepared to be part of it. In closing he extended best wishes to the incoming President David Lorschy and his committee for 2023.

#### Election of Management Committee and Office Bearers 2023/24

President Dean advised that, in accordance with Clause 5 of the Club's Constitution, he had appointed Charles Kent, him not being otherwise associated with the Committee, as Returning Officer.

Charles Kent as Returning Officer took control of the meeting and conducted the Election of Office Bearers – 2023/2024. He reported:

"I'm required to declare that all Management Committee positions are now vacant.

#### Minutes of the 47th Annual General Meeting (cont)

I can confirm that all processes required by Clause 5 of our Club's Constitution, which is to do with the election of our Management Committee for the ensuing year, have been properly met, regarding the calling for and receipt of nominations.

The nominations received have been examined and are in order. Those nominated have formally accepted their nominations, which have been properly proposed and seconded by other club members.

The Club's Standing Resolutions provide that the Management Committee comprise five statutory positions, being President, Vice President, Secretary/Public Officer, Treasurer and Activities Officer, together with four other committee members. Additionally the immediate Past President has a position on the Committee in an exofficio capacity.

There being only one nomination for each of the Committee Member positions, I can therefore declare that these nominees are duly elected as our Management Committee for 2023/24, and express our congratulations and thanks for taking on these roles on our behalf."


Charles then returned the Chair of the meeting to Dean to invest David Lorschy with the President's Chain of Office.

He thanked the Committee members for nominating and welcomed new members Margaret Timbs and Bob Way to the Management Committee. David said he welcomed suggestions from members for improvement of the Club. With the support of the Management Committee, he would work to continue operation of the Club by providing activities that members enjoyed; recruiting new members to ensure that the Club had the personal and financial resources that it needed; and start preparations for celebrating the Club's 50th anniversary in 2026.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed at 11.45 am.

#### **Tour to the Grampians**

#### Recollections of an Enjoyable 7 Days for 5 Enthusiastic Travellers

It was a cool early start as we set off for the airport and our flight to Melbourne. The first 2 nights were spent in HALL'S GAP and the GRAMPIAN National Park. The landscape enroute being flat and very, very dry – the green and lush scenery of The Grampians was very welcome indeed. The Fitzroy Falls were disappointing as the drought meant that there was only a trickle way down at the base of the Falls.



Next day on to HAMILTON, the well cared town known for its sheep grazing.

PORTLAND (on the coast) and as the name suggests is a very large port where woodchip Is emptied into the hoppers directly from large vehicles which seem much



too large to be balanced at such a steep angle. It does seem however to be a very efficient and time saving operation. The woodchip is then shipped to wherever it is needed.

A visit to the Maritime Discovery Museum followed – an informative and interesting hour with a very knowledgeable ex-Navy guide. It was particularly interesting to hear about the life cycle of the sperm whale and how they must get their fresh drinking water from the food they eat.

#### **Tour to the Grampians**

ROBE, an attractive coastal town with a long history – Marcia, a tour guide, joined our coach and gave us a very good grounding in the history both older and more recent of the development of the area. Only 1200 permanent residents but the population swells to more than 20,000 in the summer holidays – quite a challenge for a small town. Therefore there are lots of holiday homes and rental accommodation.

Back to our hotel and a little free time. SHH! Who was it who dived into the swimming pool before realising he was still wearing his hearing aids. Oops! All good though, they dried out, recharged and were operating well by morning.

After a cue from our Coach Captain, Jeff, we check our phones to see that they have adjusted the time to the  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour lost by crossing into South Australia. Our visit to the Blue Lake somewhat hampered for the photographers due to a very overcast sky. It is still blue though.





The "Umpherston Sinkhole" (sunken garden) was once a limestone cave formed due to erosion of limestone rocks by waves of seawater. Now a lovely garden has been planted.

Onwards to PENOLA and the Mary McKillop Penola Interpretive Centre – followed by shopping time in the village of Penola where we were able to leave more tourist dollars behind.

Last, but by no means least we travel through western Victoria to the City of Ballarat and The Botanic Gardens – magnificent! The unusually shaped hot house and the treasures within. Begonias in all shapes and sizes – very crowded on a Sunday afternoon but plenty of opportunity for photos.

As we then drove to the Art Gallery for a short visit, in a street with wonderful old buildings – it was the only place we saw any graffiti! Sad......

#### "The Cartographer"

The British expression "curates egg" comes to mind -- thus " this book is a bit of a curates egg". Let me explain. There was not unanimity of opinion whereby there was a consortium of sceptics including Marg T "couldn't connect or suspend belief"; Marg C " very unlikely fantasy, although a good story teller"; Jenny "hard to get into -not her type of book"; Carol "didn't engage" and Juliet found it "a bit tedious and got sick of tunnels and the "Boys Own" vernacular"

Then lurking on the other side of the egg was a stalwart army of believers---Vincie who "read it twice and enjoyed the descriptive turn of phrase and the vivid imagination"; Allison "couldn't put it down and enjoyed the turn of speech"; and Bob who "couldn't put it down, enjoying the view of the world of an eleven year old".

So where does this leave us?

Tom's twin is mortified by the crushing death of his brother and his guilt haunts him throughout the narrative. Mum has departed the family and her unfaithful husband. Our remorseful twin lives in the seedier part of Melbourne in the late 1950s and we come to share his "Boys Own Annual" adventures through the medium of serials, comic books and super heroes. He talks to the deceased Tom and even speaks like Tom on occasions suffering "turns" from time to time (being threatened with ECT)

The raison d'etre of this cavalcade of adventures is mapping his environment and scoring events 1 to 10!

He is witness to horrible events including a murder, torture, rape, kidnapping and corrupt police and becomes the target of the perpetrators, resulting in him taking to the drains and sewers. He navigates these with extreme cleverness and accesses from underneath various abodes and warehouses souveniring objects for his collection (including a live grenade).

Now this young adventurer adopts his grandfather (a past felon) as his confidante and they share his worldly experiences. Is he far too knowledgeable on current affairs and a myriad of movies? Could his language be more advanced than that of a twelve year old?

Our hero continues his adventures adopting various superhero personas, running like a rat through the sewers, breaking open doors and being generally antisocial. His pal the dog "Biscuit", a canine of many names, depending on the circumstances, is ultimately hit by a tram or shot by the policeman! His new dog costs sixpence and so is called "Zac" thankfully having not cost a "Penny"

There are some clever one liners and the whole fantasy ends in a whimper.
