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**Book Club** 



With a full roll-up, we had a lively discussion about this month's book selection, written by the celebrated American author James McBride.

The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store is set in the 1930s in Chicken Hill, a very poor neighborhood of the backward town of Pottsville Pa. The inhabitants are the sad communities of Blacks and immigrant Jews who have been left behind by their more upwardly mobile cousins. United by distrust of Government and of white society as typified by the Klu Klux Klan, these two communities have learnt to rub along with each other. A shining light is provided by Moshe, who runs a theatre introducing some of the famous jazz players of the era, and his wife Shona, whose unprofitable grocery store is a centre of community life.

At the heart of the story is the struggle of these two communities to cooperate in rescuing Dodo, a deaf-dumb but intelligent black boy who has been incarcerated in a horrendous State institution for the insane.

Most of us found this longish novel rather hard to get into. The idioms and speech rhythms of both communities are unfamiliar to us. Reflecting generations of fear, nobody ever gives any serious question a straight answer which makes it difficult to follow the plot. And there are too many characters. But perseverance rewarded those of us who reached the end. Our talking points included racism (both conscious and unconscious), deprivation, degrees of evil and retribution.

Next month we will reveal how little we understand our Shakespeare when we are called upon to review Judi Dench's anecdotes collected as Shakespeare: The Man who Pays the Rent. We couldn't find a viable alternative to meeting on Good Friday even though several of us will be unavailable.


