Australian Inventions

There are many significant Australian inventions and ideas that have been adopted by the World.

Our speaker, Martin Kinsky, a retired corporate lawyer, clearly was looking for something to do and oddly this 'something' found him. He went to a local event and due to a non-arrival of a speaker someone stood up and spoke about inventions by Hungarians. This sparked Martin's quest to go digging for stories about Australian inventions and inventors. He researched extensively, taking hours, days and years (ask his wife) as very little had been published.

He unearthed a treasure trove of inventors and wanted "to represent dates, places and ideas", that is history, but categorically refused to talk about smashed avocado toast or vegemite (which by the way was invented in 1922 as a local alternative to British marmite).

The following is but a very small extract from Martin Kinsky's some 28 significant discoveries:

- * **Ice-making machine:** From mid-19th century ice was being shipped to Australia from the US and later Norway as a luxury, incurring enormous costs of importing ice and maintaining ice houses. In 1851 James Harrison put his first mechanical ice-making machine in operation, the device becoming a viable alternative for the remote Victoria colony. In 1854 his commercial ice-making machine followed and in 1855 a patent for an ether refrigeration system was granted. Now people could have regular deliveries by the iceman and ice chests became a fixture in many homes. Founder of Victorian Ice Works, James Harrison was often called "the father of refrigeration".
- * **An accidental apple:** Maria Ann Smith, a mother of eight, immigrated from England with her husband in 1839, purchased a small orchard in Eastwood and propagated an apple cultivar from a chance seedling. In 1890 she won a prize for the "Smith's Seedling" and in 1895 The Agriculture Dept. began to grow the trees and promote the green apple. Now known as 'Granny Smith', the apple has achieved popularity and fame – even featuring as part of US Apples Postcard Stamp set in 2013.
- * **Wine:** Dr. Thomas Angove immigrated from UK in 1886 and settled in the Tea Tree Gully area, Sth. Australia. He became a winemaker and developed a cardboard box to contain wine in a plastic bag with an inserted tap. Known as cask wine, it was also fondly dubbed as 'Chateau Cardboard'.

And, there is the Hills Hoist, not invented by Hill, the Victa lawn mower and the StumpJump plough to join the Pantheon...
